DINING AREA REFURBISHMENT

Our dining room had an overhaul during the summer and was completely refurbished. This included a new ceiling, new lighting, flooring and a new serving area; there are now two serving areas and an additional self service area in the middle. Fortunately we have now returned to our wider pre-Covid menus and are able to re-introduce our 'Taste of...' world cuisine days which started with a 'Taste of Mexico' day in November.



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IT SUITE AND LIBRARY

A new carpet was fitted in the Cox-Simpson Library and as well as being re-decorated, the Library IT Suite had new desks and equipment installed.

IT INFRASTRUCTURE

Over the summer the IT infrastructure was significantly updated. As well as new compact desktops for our classrooms and IT suites, all network equipment was updated. New classroom sets of laptops have been provided

in Prep School and the Modern Foreign Languages Department has had the languages lab replaced with a more flexible suite of laptops, allowing access to state-ofthe art Sanako software as well as other language software.

NEW SIXTH FORM CENTRE

Meet... alumni -Dr Frankie Jackson-Spence

Former pupil Frankie started at Gateways, aged 4, in 1997 and completed A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Maths.

After finishing the Sixth Form at Gateways, Frankie took a gap year and worked to save up enough money to go travelling to Australia and used her gap year as an opportunity to get some more work experience in medicine.

Frankie studied medicine at the University of Birmingham and achieved Honours and Distinction in her MBChB Medicine and Surgery degree, but also did an intercalated Biomedical Science degree and achieved First Class Honours. She developed an interest in oncology and cancer clinical trials and is doing a Clinical Research Fellowship at St Bartholomew's Hospital in London, working in kidney and bladder cancer trials and drug development.

What did you enjoy most about going to Gateways?

I absolutely loved going to school and I really do look back at my time there as the best days of my life! I enjoyed that the school was small so you knew who everyone was and we had a real community.

What were your favourite subjects and why?

I always loved the sciences and I was hugely inspired by Dr Newton who made our lessons so enjoyable and really invested in us as individuals. I currently work in cancer clinical trials and I think that interest stems from the passion she showed when she talked to me about the research she was involved in before she decided to become a teacher.

I also loved studying RS as we used to all sit round one desk and have really interesting debates. I learnt some great life skills, which I didn't realise at the time, such as viewing things from someone else's perspective.

Did you take part in any extracurricular activities?

I absolutely did! I played netball all throughout school and enjoyed playing competitively for Leeds too. I played tennis in the summer, and still play to this day! I also really enjoyed my time doing the LEAP Young Enterprise scheme where we learnt how to set up and run a business. I was a keen member of the environment club too and completed all of the LAMDA drama levels. I also did bronze, silver and gold Duke of Edinburgh awards.

I was heavily invested in every aspect of Gateways life, so I was really proud to have been chosen as Harewood House captain when I was in Lower 6, and Head Girl for my final year.

Do you have any tips for pupils thinking of joining Gateways?

It will be the best thing you ever do. Not only is it a great school academically, but I feel it teaches you to have life ambition. Gateways gave me the confidence to give things a go and not give up if I got knocked back.

How would you sum up Gateways in 3 words?

Family. Ambition. Unique.

Alongside her NHS work, Frankie developed a keen interest in preventative lifestyle medicine and created an educational social media platform where she creates free educational health content, busts the myths surrounding common health topics and starts conversations on taboo subjects such as women's health. Focus on... Drama

Mrs Hamlyn, Mrs Foster, Miss Cook and Mrs Bartle

Drama plays an important role for stimulating creativity in children. As a largely practical and completely inclusive subject, it changes perceptions and allows children to communicate with confidence, encouraging cooperation and critical thinking.

At Gateways, our drama lessons are designed to develop imagination and creativity. By focusing on three main areas: creating, performing and responding, pupils learn to problem-solve, adapt and develop skills and ideas and make sense of the world around them

We encourage a love of drama early on; in Early Years we actively foster and develop children's growing imaginations through drama, role play, singing and movement. We provide role play areas such as a home corner, doctors surgery or a garden centre for children to explore and develop their understanding of the world around them. Music, song and dance enable children to express themselves and is an integral part of every day. We make full use of the Performing Arts Centre and produce two concerts annually, one at Christmas and one in the summer term.

> The children in Upper 2 and Lower 3 have an hour's drama lesson each week. Through games and fun activities, we aim to develop the children's confidence, imagination and team work as well as giving them opportunities to develop public speaking and characterisation techniques. We also use drama as a way of bringing to life humanities and English work, helping the children to gain a deeper understanding of the topics or texts they are studying.



In the summer term, the Juniors traditionally stage a production in the Performing Arts Centre. This is always a highlight and gives the children chance to act, sing and dance in front of a live audience.



Gateways prides itself on the quality of its school productions. In November, we were excited to be able to put on a High School production – Chicago! As the nature of this production had adult themes running throughout, it was decided that KS4 and KS5 pupils would be our main focus. Sophie Rushfirth (Velma), Lucy Sherman (Roxie) and Maia Walker (Billie Flynn) demonstrated phenomenal talent and maturity in their performance supported by a cast of exceptional actors, dancers and musicians.



As pupils move into High School, drama also includes the experience of watching live theatre. The next trip is being planned for Upper 4, Lower 5 and Upper 5 to see 'Blood Brothers' at Darlington Hippodrome theatre in February. Over the course of the next academic year it is our aim to offer a live theatre experience to every pupil in High School.





Extracurricular sessions are always popular in drama. Next term, the after school High School drama club, led by Mrs Hamlyn, will be offered to all KS3 pupils. In addition to this, Mrs Malone offers small group and individual drama lessons to those in Reception through to Upper 6 during the school day.

The 2021 results were outstanding with 100% pass rate and 98% distinction. "One of the most magical moments when teaching acting is when a student lets go of all inhibitions and gives a truthful performance. In lessons, I provide exercises that will hopefully bring many of these moments. I have created a wide range of exercises to help students improve their acting technique. Topics covered include acting, poetry, mime, improvisation, and sight reading. Pupils work towards yearly examinations entered on age and ability, gaining UCAS Tariff points for all level 3 examinations to augment University entry." Mrs Malone



'WHEN YOUR LEGS GET TIRED, **RUN WITH YOUR HEART'**

IN HIGH SCHOOL THE UPPER 3, LOWER 4 & UPPER 4 PUPILS HAVE TAKEN ON A FITNESS CHALLENGE TO IMPROVE THEIR CARDIOVASCULAR FITNESS, COMPLETING 6 WEEKS OF CROSS COUNTRY.

They had to run between 1km and 2.4kms. For some, the challenge was to simply run it all each week without walking and for others the challenge was to run it as fast as possible.

Before and after each run, we have discussed pacing, aerobic fitness and heart rate. The pupils should know that the heart is the most important organ in the body and a very good way of looking after it is to engage in cardiovascular exercise. Feeling out of breath when doing exercise is normal and they should try to push themselves enough to allow themselves to get out of breath. Increasing their heart rate will help to increase their heart health. We would like the pupils to continue to think about their own fitness as regular exercise can lead to long term health benefits.
