# Meet... alumni -Camilla Barker

## Former pupil Camilla started at Gateways in 2001 and completed A Levels in Biology, English Literature and Geography as well as an A/S Level in German.

Camilla left Gateways in 2015 and attended Durham University to study Anthropology and Primatology before travelling throughout Africa working in conservation and raising various species of animal. Alongside this, she also trained as a crisis counsellor and Samaritan.

For the past four years Camilla has been studying Veterinary Medicine at the University of Zagreb, in Croatia. She chose this path initially as a way of working hands-on in conservation, however, along the way she discovered her passion and talent for medicine and surgery. Her areas of interest currently lie in emergency & critical care and shelter medicine.

Camilla recently qualified as a Marine Mammal Medic with the British Divers Marine Life Institute and is travelling to Thailand this summer having been awarded a scholarship from the Federation of Veterinarians in Europe to undertake an intensive surgical training course, run by the Worldwide Vet Service.

"I adore living in the Balkans and have even learned to speak Croatian. I have met people from all over the world and I would absolutely recommend studying or living abroad. Earlier this year, I became a surgical volunteer in our faculty clinics,



and have travelled to the Ukraine border with an American veterinarian to set up vet clinics and treat refugee pets."

#### What did you enjoy most about going to Gateways?

I attended Gateways School my entire learning life, so I do consider myself to be somewhat of an expert on the subject. Thanks to the support I received from being a very small child to an adult, I was able to develop a solid work ethic that led me to believe anything is achievable, if I put my mind to it. I think every student leaving Gateways carries this sense of self-belief and strong roots, that allows them to succeed in whichever path they choose.

#### What were your favourite subjects and why?

English was always my favourite subject. I have nothing but fond memories of spending hours reading books in class (complete with dramatic voices), unearthing hidden meanings of poems and stories, and of course writing our own, usually to great hilarity.


I also loved geography, especially at A Level; I liked thinking creatively and writing essays using statistics. It also inspired me to travel.

We have had so many trips this term, unfortunately far too many to feature here in detail! In summary...



Over the Easter holidays 15 cadets and 4 staff from Gateways School CCF (which also hosts Horsforth School), departed for the Isle of Wight on exercise 'Spring Splash'. The event took place at the UK Sailing Academy, where the participants gained national governing body qualifications from the Royal Yacht Association.

11 of the cadets gained their RYA Youth Stage 1 in Windsurfing. Two of the junior cadets achieved RYA Youth Stage 2 and the two senior cadets achieved RYA Adult Level 1 in Dinghy Sailing. Three of the adult staff also gained the RYA Powerboat Level 2 qualification, in preparation for them becoming Dinghy Sailing Instructors in the future.

Our weekly training sessions culminated with the annual summer camp during the last week of term at Wathgill Training Camp in Catterick.

Each team had carefully planned their route cards and had worked out how far and how long it would take to complete each leg, where they were met by their assessor. Towards the end of the term the DofE gold expedition took place in the Yorkshire Dales. Participants spent 3 nights and 4 days in a challenging environment and all successfully achieved the award.

# Focus on... Extra-curricular

Extra-curricular activities are a fantastic way for children to explore new hobbies and interests, develop skills in a particular area, make new friends, learn social skills and most of all have fun!

Our clubs start in Pre-Reception where children as young as 3 can try Rugbytots, creative dance classes and Spanish classes. In addition to this when children start Reception they can also develop their skills in tennis and speech and drama classes. If a gentler approach is preferred, Hama beads club provides space and time for mindfulness and creativity.



As children move through school, skipping club, nature club, games club, drawing club and cheerleading are offered to name just a few. Often the thoughts and ideas expressed by pupils at school council meetings are considered when deciding which clubs to offer. There is something for everyone!



We have numerous sports clubs ranging from ultimate frisbee and karate through to football, rugby and cricket. Dance, tennis and karate are offered all year-round by external specialists whilst the team sports rotate in their offering on a termly basis.

In Prep and High School, girls have hockey, football and netball in the autumn and spring followed by cricket and rounders in the summer term. Ultimate frisbee runs all year and our team have had success nationally, coming 3rd in the Junior Women's National Tournament.

For the boys the offering opens with rugby in the autumn followed by football and hockey in the spring culminating in cricket for the summer. Basketball has been introduced in the last two years and runs all year round and has proved to be hugely popular with all

If music is more to your liking, as well as private instrument tuition covering a wide range of instruments, we offer a High School and Prep orchestra where instrumentalists get the opportunity to play with other musicians in an ensemble setting. Recent music we have rehearsed includes a medley from 'Aladdin' and the 'Star Wars' theme.

We have four choirs in the school, a Key Stage 3 choir who are introduced to harmony singing, this choir is currently focussing on learning the repertoire from 'Moana' for our exciting production in November! We also have 'Counterpoint', our chamber choir for singers in Lower 5 and above where pupils have the opportunity to

In Prep, there is a vocal ensemble for pupils in Upper 2 and Lower 3 and a Prep choir consisting of all pupils from Lower 3, Upper 2, Lower 2 and Upper 1. Alongside this, we have a string quartet who rehearse each week and perform in concerts and other events at school.



Our staff members also run a varied timetable of lunchtime clubs for specific year groups which include chess, skipping, art, weighted hula hooping and running club as well as subject clubs for those wanting to practise or develop their knowledge in a subject area.

For those who love an adventure and the great outdoors we have our Combined Cadet Force and the popular D of E award scheme. Prep pupils can also get a taste for the outdoors and exploring nature in our Young Explorer Team Initiative (YETI) club which is for pupils in Lower 3 and Upper 3.
