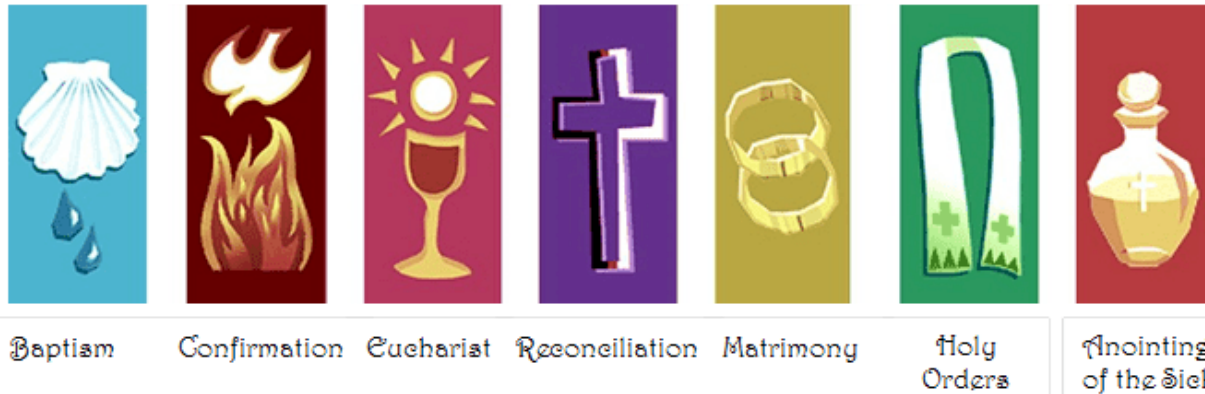


Lower 5 religious studies pupils learn the Christian sacraments
