Extra-curricular new initiatives

GIFTED & TALENTED ART PROGRAMME

We have recently introduced a Gifted and Talented Art Programme in Prep School for a select group of pupils who consistently demonstrate originality, creativity, and a passion for art and design.

These pupils not only extend the briefs they are given but also show enthusiasm for exploring artistic expression beyond the classroom. Currently, the programme is open to Lower 3 (Year 6), however we hope to expand it across Upper Key Stage 2 to celebrate exceptional talent.

The group, led by Miss Adamson, meets weekly as part of an extracurricular club, where the pupils are given creative tasks to explore both in school and at home. So far, they have completed two exciting projects: one based on the theme 'Imagination and Fantasy', and another where they studied an artist of their choice, creating an artwork inspired by their style while adding their own unique flair.

Next, these talented artists will play a key role in designing props and backdrops for the Lower and Upper Key Stage 2 productions.

STRIVE PROGRAMME

This year in High School, we launched an exciting new initiative for our Lower 5 pupils: the STRIVE Programme.

STRIVE stands for Success, Talents, Resilience, Independence, Volunteering & Elevation; its core aim is to develop pupils into independent academics, equipping them with the skills to undertake research projects and present their findings in a clear and professional manner.

At the end of the programme, pupils will deliver their own 'TED Talk' to an audience of family and friends, who will be invited into school for an evening of learning and discussion.

Pupils meet every Monday lunchtime for workshops covering essential skills such as evaluating sources, critical thinking, and public speaking - key tools to

TRIPS AND VISITS

Here's a summary of some of the trips and visits which have taken place this term:

Ski trip to Italy

69 pupils from Upper 2 to Upper 6 spent the February half term break away on the annual school ski trip to Folgarida in Italy. Pupils had fantastic skiing conditions and as well as their daily ski lessons they took part in ice-skating, swimming, karaoke, quizzes and team building exercises.





Lower 4 Liverpool trip

In March, Lower 4 enjoyed their cultural residential to Liverpool. Their trip included a tour of Anfield stadium, an open top city sights bus tour and a visit to the World Museum and Western Approaches (a World War 2 bunker and interactive museum). Pupils also enjoyed a performance of Blood Brothers at the Liverpool Empire Theatre which linked to work they studied in their drama lessons.

Non-residential trips this term included Upper 2's visit to Eureka, Lower 1's day at Pontefract Castle and Askham Bryan Wildlife Conservation Park and Transition learnt all about plants at Harlow Carr.

Exercise LOST PATROL was a navigational exercise that pushed cadets to their limits. The exercise was not just a test of navigation, but also of leadership and teamwork - resilience and problem-solving abilities were on full display, and it was a fantastic opportunity for them to develop practical skills in real-world situations.

Later in the term, the cadets took part in an exciting residential weekend, Exercise HALFWAY, at Altcar Training Camp in Liverpool. The weekend provided the perfect setting for a comprehensive training session that included first aid, navigation, and fieldcraft. The cadets spent their time learning critical survival skills, from dealing with medical emergencies to mastering the art of map reading and outdoor techniques. By the



end of the weekend, each cadet had earned their star badges, a reflection of their hard work, commitment, and success in completing the training. In addition to their training, the cadets had the opportunity for a bit of friendly competition in an E-Karting race at Gravity Max.

Have you always been a teacher?

Prior to joining Gateways in 2018, I worked at a primary school local to where I live. Before taking up my current role as Deputy Head in September 2024, I was Head of Pastoral Care in KS2 and prior to that I was Head of English in the Prep School.

What made you want to go into a career in teaching?

After I finished my degree, I went straight into teaching. I knew I wanted to be a teacher because I loved primary school when I was a child and I had experienced the benefit of being taught by fun, caring and inspiring teachers whilst I was there. I was keen to take on that role and inspire a new generation of children myself.



What are your favourite things about Gateways?

I love that every day is different and therefore never boring. I also feel very grateful to work in such a warm and welcoming environment where everyone, children and adults alike, supports one another.

What was your favourite subject when you were at school and why?

My favourite <u>subject</u> was always English because I loved immersing myself in different stories and exploring the characters and the language.

I wholeheartedly believe that by really getting to know a child, you can meet their needs as an individual.

Meet Mrs Carver

"As part of my leadership responsibilities I work closely with the Key Stage Pastoral Leads, Director of Digital Strategy, SENCo, extracurricular and super curricular coordinators to plan, review and quality assure our Senior School provision. I'm involved in the key transition stages, I lead the options processes in both Upper 4 and Upper 5 and oversee all Senior School parents' evenings. I still manage to get some teaching time in and share responsibility for two A Level Psychology teaching groups and coordinate the EPQ qualification. As a qualified science teacher, I also occasionally do some teaching in that department too!"

Have you always been a teacher?

Before Gateways, I was the Vice Principal at another local independent school which was a very similar role to this one. I have held other leadership roles in education - in Sixth Form and as a former Head of Department. I began my teaching career in a large comprehensive school and spent several years in the state sector before moving to the independent education. As a Psychology graduate, my early career was not in teaching; I started my career with an NHS Trust in clinical research and audit before moving into Primary Care working with vulnerable children in very deprived communities.

What made you want to go into a career in teaching?

My work in vulnerable communities took me into schools

What do you like to do in your spare time?

I love being outdoors as it calms and relaxes me. More than anything in the world, I love reading books with my two young boys.

Can you tell us something about yourself that not many people know?

Before going to university, I spent 6 months training to be a nurse until I realised blood and gore aren't really my thing!

and I saw the difference that schools and teachers made to children. I wanted to be part of that and so started my personal journey into teaching.

What are your favourite things about Gateways?

The relationships. Education here is about the people within it!

What was your favourite subject when you were at school and why?

ATHLETICS TRAINING not just for the summer term!

A major shift in focus for Prep School sport in the last 18 months has been towards athletics. There are so many positives to take from showing pupils how to run faster, jump higher and throw further and many crossovers to the power we require in most other sports.

Rather than wait until the summer term to start the activities, we are promoting movement and athletic awareness throughout the year. PE lessons often have a plyometric start, pupils bounding over hurdles and trying to hop in bigger strides as a means of promoting power. We now use this half term to cover indoor technical work and this prepares the pupils for the opportunity to move outside after the Easter break and for example, transfer their take off skills in long jump from the crash mats to the sand.

There has been a brilliant response from the children, many racing down to the lessons so they can cram in more exercise time, a genuine focus on improvement and a step up in competitive spirit as they try to push their own levels higher whilst trying to be the winner against a close friend.

Progress will be showcased on sports day of course, but our athletics programme has a holistic benefit for the pupils. We begin our extracurricular club after the Easter break and allow pupils across different year groups to compare and learn from each other; the High School pupils often doing a wonderful job of encouraging and supporting the younger ones. The most pleasing aspect is seeing the sport being wholeheartedly embraced by a handful of pupils who are now training at various athletics clubs outside school hours.
