The games were characterised by some excellent striking, with several batters hitting powerfully into the deep field. These long hits made it incredibly difficult for the fielding team to retrieve the ball and return it to fourth post in time to stump out runners. Most of the hits were directed towards second deep, creating tactical challenges for runners between first and second post, where a split-second decision often meant the difference between scoring a half rounder or being stumped out.

Throughout both matches, our players demonstrated improving awareness, managing to secure a number of half rounders. However, on a few occasions, hesitation or misjudged runs led to batters being stumped out. As the games progressed and the number of available batters decreased, the pressure mounted to not only stay in but also contribute to the score. In the U15 game, Liberty M showed exceptional composure and tactical play. As the final batter, she delivered a standout performance, consistently hitting the ball deep enough to allow her to score three full rounders, a crucial contribution to the team's final score.

Looking ahead, the focus will be on improving decision-making speed in the field. Rounders is a highly tactical sport, and success often comes down to how quickly players can read the game and react to evolving situations. The more we sharpen this instinct, the more competitive we will become. Overall, it was a positive and promising start to the season, and I am excited to see how the teams develop over the coming weeks.
