On Thursday, the U14 girls' rounders team faced GSAL in a highly competitive and spirited fixture, playing two full innings of 30 good balls. After a short but focused practice session at school, the team opted to field first in the opening innings.

GSAL started well, scoring a couple of quick rounders early on. However, once our players settled into their positions, they demonstrated better spatial awareness and teamwork, closing the gaps and preventing the ball from travelling through the field. This restricted GSAL's ability to score full rounders, forcing them to rely on riskier runs for half rounders.

When it was our turn to bat, the team started cautiously, scoring several half rounders. As confidence built, so did momentum, with the players improving their running between posts and hitting into deeper areas to secure full rounders. This shift in play allowed us to edge ahead, ultimately winning the first innings by just half a rounder in what was an evenly matched contest.

The second innings proved more challenging. Despite our best efforts, we encountered some bad luck, with five of our players being caught or stumped out early. These dismissals were largely the result of sharp and well-coordinated fielding from GSAL, rather than errors from our side. Nevertheless, the girls showed great determination and sportsmanship throughout.

It was a pleasure to see the team play with such energy, competitive spirit, and mutual respect. A special congratulations goes to Neiva H, who was named Player of the Match by the opposition for her outstanding contribution.
